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Does the Euregio factor on the labour market exist?

Is it related to health?

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In theory when having a better integrated Euregio

- Agglomeration economies:
 - Better sharing
 - Better learning
 - Better matching
- Impact is bigger when closer to the border and when crossborder infrastructure is better
- Disadvantage could be more competition for resources (higher ground prices, congestion, etc.)

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Empirically shown by CPB

 Borders have a negative impact on labour productivity, wages, employment, participation and unemployment



Compare bees searching for nectar in border areas if they face high border walls Production of less honey, fewer bees and fewer flowers relative to central areas



Impediments for cross-border job search

- Language and culture differences (in particular with German border) are most important
- Diploma recognition is of proven importance
- Institutional differences (tax, social insurance) of less importance
- Transport networks are less developed across borders, but this reflects low demand
- Behavior and perception interacts with other factors: less information, less cross-border networks and less trust
- Economic circumstances matter, but are asymmetrical

Evidence against existence of Euregio factor on the labour market I

 Dutch cross-border commuting is only 5 procent of potential commuting flows without borders

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Evidence against existence of Euregio factor on the labour market II


 Most recent higher education graduates in the Euregio stay at their side of the border or move to the centre of their country

Evidence against existence of Euregio factor on the labour market III


• There are hardly any common Euregio labour market trends

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For example: unemployment trend in the Euregio



Depend on national unemployment trends



Implications for health in the Euregio?

 Commuting is bad for health & internal commuting is large relative to cross-border commuting

• Relatively low labour participation rates in border regions are correlated to low health

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Further implications for health in the Euregio II

Health improvement of patients is impeded due to lack of agglomeration economies in border region:

- Less sharing
- Less learning
- Worse matching
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
